2) It is usable pieces. Fabric that has been cut into is not usable for us. Please remember that we do not do appliqué.

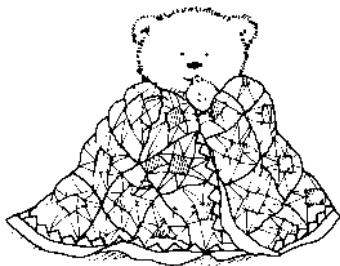
We are at the time of year when we register as members for next year.

## Charity Day Recipe Black Bean Chili:

2 lbs uncooked ground beef -OR- ground turkey breast  
1 large onion finely chopped  
1 green -OR- red pepper finely chopped  
1 (14oz can) reduced-sodium chicken broth  
2 tsp chili powder or more to taste  
1 tsp cumin  
2 (15 oz cans) black beans, rinsed and drained  
1 (14 oz can) tomato puree  
1 (28 oz can) diced tomatoes  
1 tsp brown sugar

Saute onion and pepper in skillet with a tsp of oil. Put onion and pepper in crock pot.

Brown meat in same skillet until no longer pink. Drain and add to crock pot.

Combine rest of ingredients to crock pot and cook on low for 4-5 hours

## Ricotta Cheese Cake - Janeen Sharpe

1 yellow cake mix (Duncan Hines)

2 pounds ricotta cheese

4 eggs

3/4 cup sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix cake mix per instructions on the box. Put into 9x13-inch pan, but do not bake yet. Mix ricotta cheese, eggs, sugar, and vanilla together. With a large spoon, spoon the cheese mixture over the top of the cake batter. It should cover the entire surface. Bake at 350o for 45 minutes, then turn oven down to 325o and bake an additional 15 minutes. Use toothpick to test in center for doneness. Let cool well!



## Research and Information

### History of the Quilt

Definition of a quilt: A bed coverlet of 2 layers of cloth filled with padding (such as down or batting) held in place by ties or stitched designs. *Webster's Dictionary*

In Europe quilting appears to have been introduced by Crusaders in the 12th century, in particular in the form of the aketon or gambeson a quilted garment worn under armour which later developed into the doublet.

One of the earliest existing decorative works is the "Tristan quilt", made around 1360. Made in Sicily, and as one of the earliest surviving quilts in the world. At least two sections survive at the V&A Museum and in Bargello, Florence. Russia holds the oldest example in existence, a quilted linen carpet found in a Mongolian cave, and now kept at the Saint Petersburg department of the Russian Academy of Sciences, Archaeology Section.

Quilt making was uncommon in America in the late 18th century and early years of the 19th. Most women were busy spinning, weaving and sewing in order to clothe their family. Commercial blankets or woven coverlets were a more economical bedcovering for most people. Only the wealthy had the leisure time for quilt making so Colonial quilting was done by only a few.

Obviously quilts were not made of left over scraps or worn clothing as a humble bedcovering during this period. Instead they were decorative items that displayed the fine needlework of the maker such as the Baltimore album quilts.

Whole cloth quilts, broderie perse and medallion quilts were the styles of quilts made during the early 19th century.

Broderie Perse refers to the applique of cut out motifs from printed fabric onto a solid background. These bedcoverings were usually used on the best of beds or sometimes only when guests were staying in the home.

The industrial revolution brought about the most dramatic change as textiles came to be manufactured on a broad scale. Another major shift was in the style of quilts made. Although a few earlier quilts were made in the block style, quilts made up of blocks were uncommon until around the 1840's.

### Optional Toppings:

1. Can eliminate topping with confectionary sugar for dusting or nothing at all.
  2. Serve as a short cake base and top with fresh strawberries and cool whip.
  3. 1 (3-ounce) package instant chocolate (fudge) pudding  
1 cup milk  
1 (12-ounce) container Cool Whip
- Mix pudding with 1 cup milk and add this to Cool Whip. Spread on the cake as frosting.

\* Can substitute fudge marble cake mix for the yellow cake mix.

This cake is best when baked the day before needed. Refrigerate.

We have a morbid fear of failure. We are stressed and sick over the thought that we are not enough. We look at other women and think to ourselves, "I wish my house was as organized as Sue's." or "Jean has weekly craft days with her son. I wish I was a good mother like her." or "Joan always looks so stylish. I wish I could put together an outfit like hers." or "Margret reads all the latest books and is always so well informed. I wish I had time to read." or "Ruth finishes all her embroidery projects. I'd love to finish mine."

How many among us have had similar thoughts? But did we notice that these are the attributes of 6 different women and yet we have yearned to gather to ourselves the attributes that took 6 women a lifetime to develop?

So here's the big question. Can we lighten up and give ourselves a break? Can we let the image of superwoman go once and for all? As we move into the next decade, can we agree to drop the crazy expectation that we must be perfect? It is simply not possible to grow our own vegetables, keep a daily journal in stitchery, dress like a diva, make one fabulous quilt a month, cook gourmet meals, throw Lion King themed birthday bashes for 30 children, make our husband's shirts, take harp lessons and master the yoga position known as the Standing Bow Pulling Pose while meditating on world peace. Perhaps if 10 of us banded together for 6 months we could accomplish all this and more but on our own, we are lucky to get the dishes done and fit in 20 minutes a day to finish that embroidered tea cozy for aunt Gladys. And why did we promise it to her when we work 40 hours a week while looking after a house and 3 children under the age of 4 ?

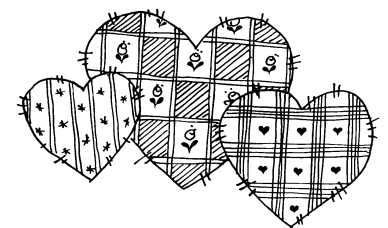
One of our problems as women in the 21st century is that we do not have role models. Our mothers had role models. They saw their mothers staying home, baking, cleaning, sewing and caring for a family who were content and happy to have mom do it all. It was rare for our grandmothers to work outside the home. They were the home. Most of our mothers grew up to copy that domestic model. Since we fought so hard in the 60s and 70s for equal pay, equal opportunities for education and employment and since we shattered the glass ceiling, we gave up past role models. We must now create the current model of the educated, autonomous career minded mother and wife. We need to do this for our daughters without the stress of also striving to be perfect at everything.

I recently made a daring move. I gave a closet full of fabrics and unfinished projects to the fabric sale. I have been moving this burden from house to house for 40 years. This year I finally decided enough is enough. One bag contained everything needed, (fabric, pattern, zipper and thread ) to make a plaid polyester pantsuit. If plaid polyester ever comes back in style, I hope I am dead. There was a half finished embroidered butterfly in turquoise and gold silk on white. In 1975 it was destined to be a toilet lid cover. What was I thinking? I blame that one on flashbacks to my Hippie days. I also donated a brocade vest with an intricately embroidered collar. It was almost finished but I will never be a size 6 again no matter how much tofu I eat. Urban birds have developed a short, fast "rap style" of singing, different from their rural counterparts.

I can't tell you how freeing it is to say goodbye to the guilt. I've been looking at all this fabric and all those unfinished projects and feeling like a failure. It is time to live in the present and spend my remaining years doing what I love, making art, reading, walking, napping, visiting family and friends and laughing, lots of laughing. If I start a book and do not wish to finish it, I won't, even if I paid \$23.99 for it. If I start a project and get bored with it, I will give it away and not feel guilty. If I am asked to do something that does not interest me, I will learn to say no. I will take time to wrap my hands around a comforting cup of tea and watch the squirrels chase each other around the tree trunk. I will not feel guilty about the dust on the windowsill. I will chase my grandson around the house with my best pillowcases pinned on us like capes and not worry about the emails I did not answer. I will turn Elton John up loud and dance around the kitchen while I make dinner and not care if the neighbors can see me through the window. I will buy frozen lasagna to take to guild meetings rather than staying up half the night to make it from scratch. I will sing out loud in the car and not stop when another driver looks at me. I will invite people over when my house is messy and serve them store bought cookies.

My mother kept a sheet covering the living room couch for her entire life. She probably couldn't even remember what the fabric looked like. While keeping it clean she neglected to enjoy it. When my grandmother died, I inherited her cedar chest. In it I found beautiful linens she had received as gifts. She thought they were too good for her to use. From now on, let's use our good linens. Let's have breakfast with our children and grandchildren on the good china. If something breaks, google Replacements.com. Let's teach our daughters that they are worthy of the best things we own. They are worthy of the best things in life.

Above all, let's not spend one more precious moment worrying about what we should be doing. Instead, let's do what we love and let's do it with gusto. Now, I must dash and discover where my grandson hid my Superwoman cape. I need to put it back on my pillow in time for my afternoon nap.

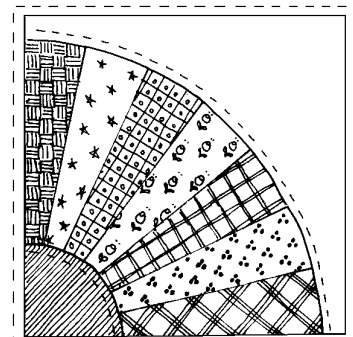
